I must apologize for the low number of books listed below under "Recent Arrivals." Over the last week, I've placed a large number or orders with publishers large and small. The books are already beginning to trickle into my home. They will soon be wending their way to those of you who have been awaiting them.

I've been extremely busy over the last two months. Following Pulpcon, I spent a couple of weeks shipping new books. This was followed by the creation of my September catalog. After that, following discussions with Jack Cullers and Barry Traylor, I began work on organizing a new and improved Pulpcon.

Jack, Barry, and I have worked together for many years, managing the auctions that are held annually at Pulpcon. Due to our work on the auctions, we were asked by convention organizer Rusty Hevelin to join his Pulpcon Committee. Eventually, due to increasing age and health problems, Rusty turned the management of the convention over to the committee, asking Bob Gorton to be the chairman of the group.

In recent years, for personal reasons, Gorton has been largely invisible at Pulpcon. When present at the show, Gorton does not seem to visibly interact with many of the attendees. Don Ramlow seems to have assumed most of the duties of the chairperson during the actual convention.

Unfortunately, in the time between Pulpcons, when much of the work necessary to stage a successful convention should be done, Gorton's uncommunicative mannerisms continue. At the same time, Ramlow, who is seen during the convention as the "voice" of Pulpcon, is likewise mostly silent. In a recent communication to the rest of the Pulpcon Committee, Ramlow suggested that he was too occupied with other interests to be involved with preparations for next year's show.

In frustration, Jack, Barry, and I asked Gorton and Ramlow to resign their positions. At the same time, the three of us professed a willingness to devote the time and energy needed to get Pulpcon moving forward. However, Gorton and Ramlow did not communicate a willingness to do as we had suggested. So Jack Cullers, Barry Traylor, and I, with the help of Ed Hulse, have decided to organize our own Pulpcon.

At this point in time, it looks as if we will be staging Pulpcon 2009 in Columbus, Ohio at the beginning of August. We plan to publicize our convention and allow a wider array of related material than has traditionally been allowed at Pulpcon. However, if we are to organize a successful convention, we will need your help. Please plan to support our convention when it is staged next year. If you are interested in lending a hand, please drop us a line. If you are a dealer and would be interested in selling at our show, please let us know as soon as possible. More particulars will follow as our plans become better defined.

The story of an actress who becomes the lover of both a private detective and an even more mysterious and powerful rich man, who has been to the human colony on an alien planet and learned strange things there. Her loyalties are divided—perhaps she loves them both. The detective helps her to release her inner beauty and become a star overnight. And the

rich man is the benefactor of a play she stars in. But something is very wrong. Money can be an evil guest, but there are other evils. As Lovecraft wrote, "That is not dead which can eternal lie"—\$26 (hardbound)
